Equity Planning strives to provide equal opportunity for those who have few, if any, choices in the planning process. Environmental Justice is a social movement that seeks to protect those who have borne the brunt of environmental hazards.

Nationally, planning decisions have historically either affected negatively or neglected low-income disadvantaged communities. For example, the urban renewal program of the 50s and 60s displaced hundreds of thousands of poor, inner-city residents in the name of revedelopment.

In San Diego's community of Barrio Logan, zoning has often failed to protect residents from environmental hazards produced by industries such as metal plating shops. Additionally, lower-income, urbanized communities of the City of San Diego often lack public facilities such as parks and libraries while the northern urbanizing communities have a superabundance of public amenities. But things are changing. Come and hear community leaders to find out what is being done to foster more equitable planning and environmental justice.
