What is RICCE?

RICCE (Rooted in Comunidad, Cultivating Equity) is a community engagement plan that connects organizations and residents to drive community improvements through:

- 9 community projects and 3 transformative plans
- Participation of 11 organizations
- A Community Advisory Board (CAB)

\$29.5 M from the State of California through Transformative Climate Communities (TCC)

Organizations

San Diego Foundation (SDF): Administers the project's implementation.



Environmental Health Coalition (EHC): Leads community engagement and the Displacement Avoidance Plan.



Tierras Indígenas Community Land Trust (TICLT): Manages the Community Land Trust.



San Diego Metropolitan Transit System (MTS): Leads public transportation improvements.



Chicano Park Museum and Cultural Center (CPMCC): Strengthens the museum's resilience and manages La Vía Verde.



Organizations

Project New Village (PNV): Coordinates The Village garden, community kitchen, and resource center.



City of San Diego (COSD): Oversees the new Boston Avenue park and permit improvements.



GRID Alternatives San Diego (GRID): Implements Holistic Healthy Homes and promotes green jobs.



Urban Corps of San Diego County (UCSDC): Leads the Workforce Development Plan.




University of San Diego: Monitors project indicators.



Gray Area: Enhances bus stops and trolley stations.




RICCE Transformative Plans



What is the CAB?

- **Name:** Community Advisory Board.
- **Purpose:** To ensure that people who live, work, or serve in the project area have a meaningful voice in the implementation of the Transformative Climate Communities (TCC) grant.
- **Membership:** The CAB is composed of 11 to 19 members
- **Good Standing:** A member who hasn't missed two consecutive general meetings. Only members in good standing can vote or serve in subcommittees.

Meetings

General meetings shall be held on a quarterly basis

Meeting notices sent 2 weeks in advance via email, website, and social media.

Quorum requires $2/3$ of current members.

Voting notices must be sent 72 hours prior.

The Secretary coordinates notices with the CEC.

Voting

Votes must be on the agenda with 72 hours' prior notice.

Proposals must be presented and seconded; approval requires a simple majority (50% + 1).

Virtual voting is allowed for members in good standing, with 72 hours' notice.

Virtual voting takes place via Survey Monkey and lasts 24 hours.


If a conflict of interest requires a CAB member to abstain, the vote may proceed if a quorum was established at the start of the meeting.

Conflicts of interest

- A conflict is any interest that may bias a decision.
- Members must handle conflicts of interest transparently.
- The involved person must identify and disclose any conflict.
- If unsure, they should inform the CEC before a vote.
- Members must complete a conflict of interest form upon joining and annually.



CAB Committees



CAB Executive Board

Includes all elected officers and the Chair shall be the Chief Executive Officer of the Board .

Manages affairs between general meetings, aligning with prior decisions.

Meets 3 weeks before the general meeting with the CEC.

The Chair or 2/3 of the members can call special meetings with 72 hours' notice.

CSS: Collaborative Stakeholder Structure Subcommittee

- 6 CAB representatives will be elected for a one-year term.
- The subcommittee provides feedback and reports CSS actions at general CAB meetings.
- CSS oversees RICCE, recommending changes, but final decisions rest with the involved Parties in consultation with SDF and the State Strategic Growth Council.
- CSS decisions are advisory and non-binding.


